Admission arrangements must be consulted upon for the 'determination year', beginning two years before the school year in which the arrangements will apply. Therefore, in the 2023-2024 school year, arrangements were being determined for the 2025-2026 school year.

All admission authorities within Bridgend completed the consultation and determination of admission arrangements for 2025-2026 within the timescale stipulated in the Regulations.

Consultation documents were received by the local authority from admission authorities outside of Bridgend – Rhondda Cynon Taf County Borough Council and St Richard Gwyn Catholic High School.

What admission arrangements have been put in place to serve the interests of vulnerable children? Have they proved successful?

What other arrangements have you identified to support these children?

The following information relates to the local authority's admission arrangements in respect of those schools for which it is the admission authority.

The local authority's centralised admission process allows greater control and monitoring of the admissions of vulnerable children.

For admissions rounds and in-year admissions/transfers processed during the 2023-2024 school year, looked after children or previously looked after children were prioritised for admission to the school of corporate parent/parent/carer choice. Officers in Pupil Services worked closely with the Education Engagement Team to ensure such pupils were able to access appropriate provision.

All children with a statement of special educational needs (SEN) or a local authority-maintained individual development plan (IDP) were admitted to the placement named on the final statement. All applications in respect of children with additional learning needs but without a statement of SEN or a local authority-maintained IDP were considered in the same way as all other applications, based on the procedures and admission criteria set out in the 2023-2024 School Admissions Policy.

The local authority did not refuse to admit a child on the basis of their behaviour. (This encompasses children considered to be potentially disruptive, exhibiting challenging behaviours or potentially requiring assessment for special educational needs.) The Mainstream Fair Access Panel considered referrals of vulnerable and hard-to place pupils.

The purpose of the Mainstream Fair Access Panel is to consider the most complex individual cases for admission to mainstream places, ensuring that pupils are placed fairly, in schools that can meet their needs, with negative impacts on the effectiveness of education provision both for the learner and the provider being minimised.

The consideration of an individual case by the Mainstream Fair Access Panel may result in reference to the Additional Learning Needs Panel and/or the Access to Education Panel. These panels have a wider remit in respect of vulnerable and hard to place children, most particularly those that may need to be considered for specialist education provisions.

The local authority's oversubscription criteria, applicable in admissions rounds, set out the relative priority of applications in respect of children with medical or psychological conditions, or particular social circumstances (such as young carers). Applications were prioritised under the criterion where the required evidence from a registered health professional was provided (the reasons why the preferred school was considered to be the most suitable school and the difficulties that would arise if the child had to attend another school) and accepted. For in-year admission/transfer applications in respect of such children where there was no capacity in the year group of the requested school, the same evidence requirements and considerations were applied to make a final determination on whether a place would be offered at the requested school.

No applications in any admissions round were received in respect of children who met the oversubscription criterion relating to children of a serving member of UK service personnel or Crown Servant. No in-year admission/transfer applications were received relating to children of a serving member of UK service personnel or Crown Servant.

From April 2022, families began to arrive in Wales from Ukraine under the national scheme arrangements. Welsh Government advised local authorities that the school admissions legislation in Wales, reflected in the statutory School Admissions Code 2013, and on which admission authorities policies are based, applied fully to admission applications in respect of arriving children. Therefore, such applications would have no exceptional status and admission authorities should process and make decisions on the applications as they would for all other applications for school places. (This same position applies in respect of children arriving in Wales under the two established refugee schemes for families from Syria and Afghanistan, and also the scheme for families from Hong Kong.) The decisions made by the local authority on applications for school admission, and home-to-school transport eligibility, for children arriving from Ukraine reflected this position.

Following an admission decision, communications with the parent/carer and the school regarding starting arrangements reflected the advice issued by the Chief Medical Officer in respect of health screening under the national pathway established for the families arriving in Wales.

In the period to 31 August 2024, the local authority received three in-year school admission applications in respect of Ukrainian children. These two were in respect of primary school learners (including Nursery), and one was in respect of a secondary-aged learner.

- For the two applications in respect of primary school learners, one was accepted and the learner was admitted to the requested schools. The remaining one application was in respect of Year 6 admission that had to be refused due to there being no places

- available in the relevant year group at the requested school. An alternative school was offered which the parent accepted.
- For the one application in respect of secondary aged learner, the application was accepted and the learner was admitted to the requested school.

No families with school-age children from Afghanistan were re-settled in Bridgend during the 2023-2024 school year.

No additional families with school-age children from Syria were re-settled in Bridgend during the 2023-2024 school year.

The local authority's admission decisions on all applications in respect of Gypsy, Roma and Traveller children took full account of the Welsh Government Circular No: 003/2008 (Moving Forward – Gypsy Traveller Education) and sections 3.25 and 3.26 of the statutory School Admissions Code for Wales, 2013.


The following information relates to in-year admission/transfer applications made to the local authority in respect of those schools for which it is the admission authority.

In accordance with the local authority's published School Admissions Policy, all in-year admission/transfer requests received during the 2023-2024 school year were considered in strict order of date received and against the requested school's published admissions number and the current class structures and numbers. Account was taken of the specific circumstances of the child and family, if appropriate. If a place was available in the relevant year group at the requested school, the place was offered. If no place was available in the relevant year group at the requested and the local authority advised the applicant/s of the next nearest school with an available place in the relevant year group and the right of appeal (for applications in respect of statutory-age education).

Mainstream in-year admission/transfer applications in respect of primary school children, including Nursery

• The number of applications received by the local authority for primary aged-children (including Nursery) is detailed in Figure 1. There was a decrease in the number of applications received in 2023-2024 compared to 2022-2023. For the previous five years from 2017-2022, there was a marginally increasing trend in the number of applications received, with the number of applications received in 2023-2024 being more in line with those for 2022-2023.




- Of the 684 applications received in 2023-2024:
 - 29 (4.2%) were withdrawn before progression to a decision by the local authority. In the majority of these cases, this was due to the application having been submitted too early, per policy, given the requested admission date, the application had been submitted in error, or the application was withdrawn as the child had been admitted to a specialist provision.
 - o 552 (80.7%) were accepted for admission to the requested school.
 - o 79 (11.5%) were refused for the requested schools, due to oversubscription of places in the requested year groups.
 - o 24 (3.5%) were refused because admission would result in an infant class size breach.
 - o For the 103 applications that had to be refused, an alternative school was offered in respect of 77. For the remainder, an alternative school was not offered as either the learner was already attending the nearest alternative school, or the parent/carer had advised that no alternative school would be considered.
- In 2023-2024, the local authority reported a surplus capacity of places in primary schools, for Reception through to Year 6, of 18.52%.

Mainstream in-year admission/transfer applications in respect of secondary-aged pupils, Years 7 to 11

• The number of applications received by the local authority for secondary-aged pupils (Year 7 to Year 11) is detailed in Figure 2. There was an increase in the number of applications received in 2023-2024 compared to 2022-2023. For the seven years from 2017-2024, there was a marginally increasing trend in the number of applications received.

- Of the 357 applications received in 2023-2024:
 - 23 (6.4%) were withdrawn before progression to a decision by the local authority. In the majority of these cases, this was due to the application being withdrawn as the child had been admitted to a specialist provision.
 - o 290 (81.2%) were accepted for admission to the requested school.
 - o 44 (12.3%) were refused for the requested schools, due to oversubscription of places in the requested year groups.
 - For the 44 applications that had to be refused, an alternative school was offered in respect of 32. For the remainder, an alternative school was not offered as either the learner was already attending the nearest alternative school, or the parent/carer had advised that no alternative school would be considered.
- In 2023-2024, the local authority reported a surplus capacity of places in secondary schools, for Year 7 through to Year 13, of 19.37%.

Please provide a short summary of the key admission issues identified for the area and how the forum has addressed them?

The following information relates to the local authority's admission arrangements in respect of those schools for which it is the admission authority.

Standardisation of admission rounds.

The forum noted the standardisation of all admission rounds being open for broadly 14 weeks, apart from the Part-Time Nursery Admission round, which would continue to be open for broadly 8 months. It was noted that there had been changes to the wordings in certain sections of the School Admissions Policy 2025-2026 to improve clarity or to reflect existing practice within the policy. The sections where changes are proposed are detailed below:

1. Section 8 – Ensuring fair Access

The local authority has a Mainstream Fair Access Panel. The panel can consider and make decisions on applications for mainstream school places for individual children within these specific groups, in accordance with the defined terms of reference.

2. Section 8.1 – Children from overseas and UK children living abroad
Welsh Government has issued guidance for admission authorities when processing applications for overseas children. The local authority will process all such applications in accordance with the published guidance.

• The number of available Part-time Nursery places in schools.

The forum noted that variation year-on-year is inevitable given the factors that determine the number of such places and that this is explained each year in the School Admissions Policy. The forum noted that if there are no Part-time Nursery places available at a school, but the Full-time Nursery number is low, the local authority consults with the school on whether it is appropriate to convert some of the unfilled Full-time Nursery places to Part-time Nursery places, for that year. The forum did not request any further action.

• Applications for first preference Welsh-medium schools with second preference English-medium schools.

The forum noted that over 50% of the applications where the first preference school was a Welsh- medium school, the second preference, where recorded, was not a Welsh-medium school. For Part-time and Full-time Nursery applications, there was a the figure was still over 50%. The forum noted that parental preference applies, and parents/carers often request that the expressed second preference, English-medium school, is processed, rather than give consideration to any other Welsh-medium schools with available places.

Admission appeal hearings.

The forum received comprehensive information on the number of admission appeals, The number of appeals had increased over the previous five years, both for admission rounds and in-year admissions, due to an increase in the number of oversubscribed schools. The forum noted that virtual appeals were becoming the preferred option for parent/carers and panel members, but the local authority would still undertake face-to-face hearing if this was requested. The forum did not request any further actions.

• School admissions for children arriving in Bridgend from Ukraine and resettlement/refugee schemes

The forum received comprehensive information on the numbers of applications received and outcomes. The forum did not request any further actions.

Advance in-year admission or transfer applications

The forum noted there were no changes to School Admission Policy 2025-2026 in respect to the process an in-year application. The forum did not request any further actions.

School admission policies of the voluntary-aided (VA) schools

The forum noted that some of the policies were extremely concise. It was suggested that the VA schools give consideration to adopting sections of the local authority policy each year, to ensure their policies are comprehensive. The diocese confirmed that they had reviewed the VA school admissions policy that were provided to the forum, and that support, and advice had been given in relation to the governing body reserving the right to admit over their admission number in respect of applications from those of Catholic faith. The necessary amendments were made, and the forum did not request any further action.

Admission arrangements with neighbouring authorities

The forum noted the proposal to improve clarity on the admission arrangements with neighbouring authorities regarding transport arrangements. There are no admission arrangements in place with neighbouring authorities.

Co-ordinated school admission arrangements

The forum noted the Welsh Government Consultation for Co-ordinated school admission arrangements opened at the end of November 2023 and feedback was to be returned by the 12 January 2024. The forum noted that The Education (Co-ordination of School Admission Arrangements and Miscellaneous Amendments) (Wales) Regulations 2024, require local authorities to formulate and publish a scheme to co-ordinate admission arrangements for all maintained schools, (except school sixth form place, maintained special schools and maintained Nursery schools, but including boarding schools) within their area. The forum highlighted that in order to work within the co-ordinated admission arrangements, any application for would need to reflect the additional questions and supplementary information required for the voluntary-aided schools.
